FROM RECESS MINUTES OF GRAND LODGE FOR YEAR 1863

Oct. 9 - A Warrant in due form signed by the M. Wor. Grand Master was issued for the establishment of a Military Lodge in Wickhams Brigade Va. Cavalry by the name, title and designation of Lee Lodge No. 209 and appointing A. C. Randolph, Master, Thomas H. Owen, Senior Warden, and John A. Chappell, Junior Warden.

MILITARY LODGES IN THE CIVIL WAR



The House Undivided states that in an effort to meet the social and fraternal needs of the soldiers of the North and South **there were not less than 244/251 "Traveling Military Lodges"** operating during the War Between the States. **Ninety-eight were Union Lodges and 153 were Confederate.** Among the more active Grand Lodges were: **Texas (50/33) , Indiana (37/38), Mississippi /29 and Virginia (28/26).** These states accounted for over half of the military lodges.

Alabama granted dispensations to 19 lodges. P 106

Arkansas granted dispensations to 16 lodges.

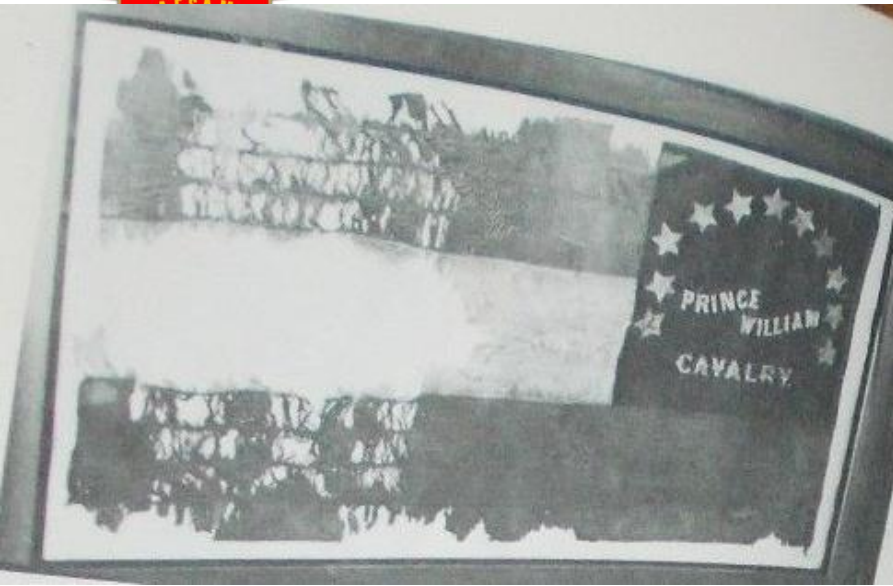

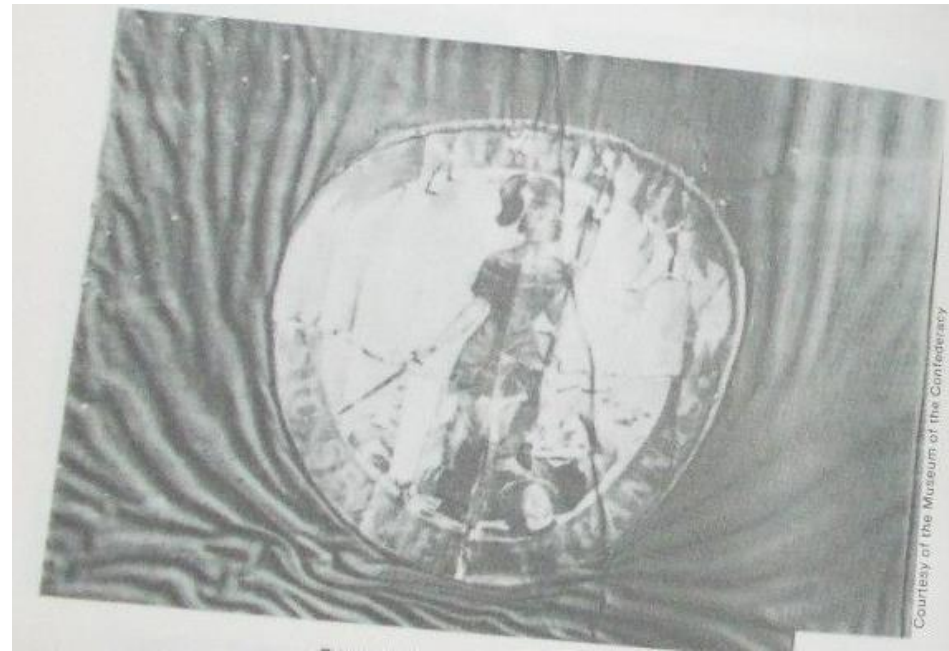
THE VIRGINIA 4TH CAVALRY COMPLETED ITS ORGANIZATION AT SANGSTER'S CROSS ROADS, PRINCE WILLIAM COUNTY, VIRGINIA, ON SEPTEMBER 19, 1861. THE 4TH VIRGINIA CAVALRY REGIMENT INCLUDED THE FOLLOWING COMPANIES (ALL PREVIOUSLY INDEPENDENT MILITIA COMPANIES):

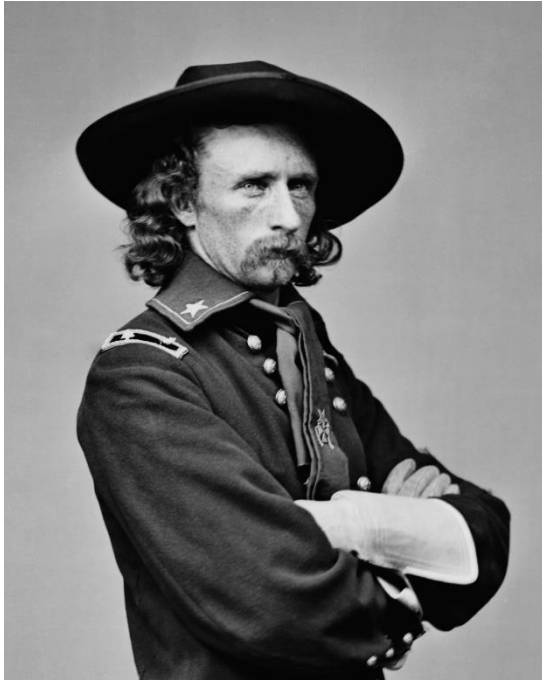
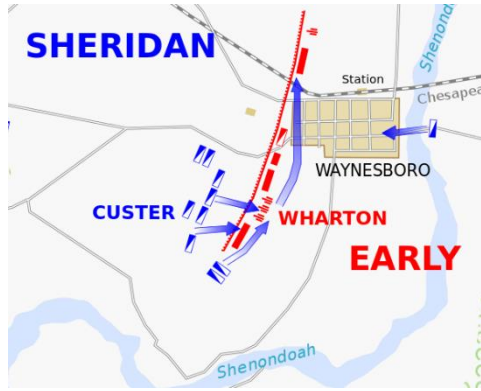
ROUT AT WAYNSBORO



- Gen Sheridan and two divisions moved out of their winter quarters on February 27, 1865, and headed east. The orders from Gen. Grant were largely discretionary: they were to destroy the Virginia Central Railroad and the James River Canal, capture Lynchburg if practicable, then either join William T. Sherman in North Carolina or return to Winchester.
- On the way to Petersburg, at the Battle of Waynesboro, March 2, Custer (1,500) trapped the remainder of Early's army and 1,600 / 2,500 soldiers surrendered. --- Charlottesville. Battle Flags for Tad Lincoln.

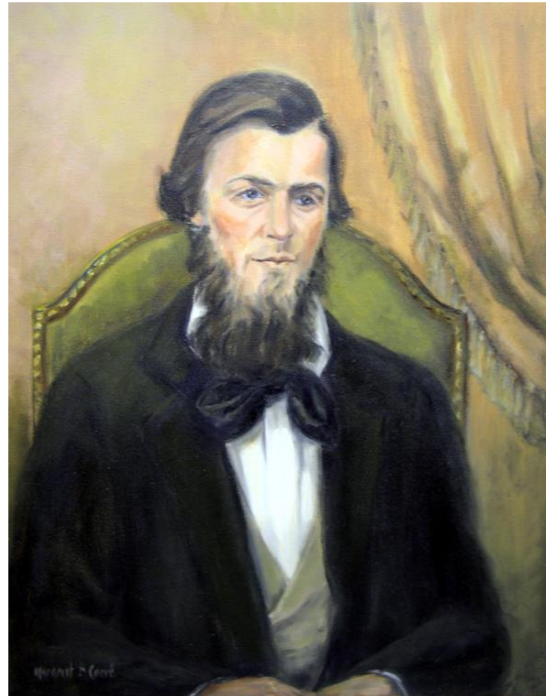

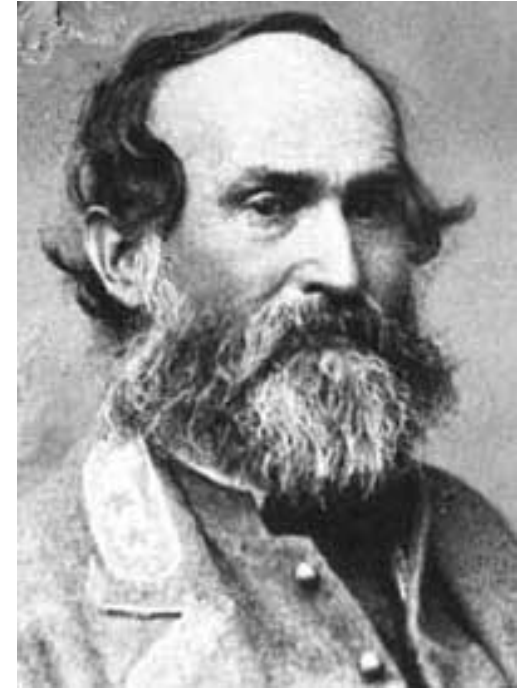

- William Harman was killed in action; surrounded by five Federal troopers, Harman refused their entreaties to surrender and was killed.
- William Henry Harman (February 17, 1828 – March 2, 1865) was a brigadier general in the Virginia militia and colonel in the Confederate States Army during the American Civil War (Civil War). Prior to the war, Harman had served as a second lieutenant in the 1st Virginia Infantry Regiment during the Mexican-American War, after which he had become a lawyer. He was commonwealth's attorney for Augusta County, Virginia from 1851 until the beginning of the Civil War, when he was appointed a brigadier general in the state militia.
- As a brigadier general, Harman commanded part of the militia force that seized the Harper's Ferry Armory and Arsenal near the beginning of the war on April 18, 1861. He served as lieutenant colonel of the 5th Virginia Infantry Regiment of the Stonewall Brigade from May 7, 1861 to April 1862, when he failed to be appointed colonel in the April 1862 reorganization of the Confederate Army. Harman next served briefly as an aide-de-camp to Brigadier General Edward Johnson in Jackson's Valley Campaign, after which he was appointed an assistant adjutant general on February 19, 1864. He commanded a regiment of reservists at the Battle of Piedmont on June 5, 1864.
